Setting the Future Course of the WSSA

am writing to ask for your help in setting the future course of the Western Social Science Association. One of the ways that our future is determined is by the selection of new leadership for the association. Those who serve as Section Chairs are often taking the first step toward leadership in WSSA; many Executive Council Members first offered their time and talents by acting as coordinators for their disciplinary sections. Others have consistently attended the annual conferences, maintained their memberships, and promoted the association to colleagues and students. These are all good ways to serve and support WSSA. While not all members aspire to serve as an elected officer of the association, many find it a rewarding and natural progression of their service to WSSA.

As immediate Past-President of WSSA, I serve as chair of a Nominating Committee for next year's election of

council members and officers. I am in the process of forming the committee, and we will present our slate of candidates to the council for approval during our September 2003 council meeting. Elections will be held sometime early in 2004.

As a member of WSSA, each of you has the ability to offer direct nominations for council seats. According to WSSA's

Constitution:

The Committee shall submit to the Fall meeting of the Executive Council one or more nominees for each office to be filled. Members may offer additional nominations by petition signed by five (5) members sent to the Executive Director, prior to the Fall meeting, postmarked no later than August 1. Upon ratification by majority vote of the Executive Council the Council shall send the list of nominees (including those by petition) to the membership. The Executive Director shall mail the completed ballots to the membership (Article II, section 4).

If you, as a member, wish to nominate another member for a council seat, this is the way to do it. You are also free to contact me to suggest a potential nominee so that the committee can contact that person directly to assess their interest in serving

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WSSA News Going On-line

During the last Executive Council meeting we discussed a variety of ways in which we could reduce the cost of doing business. In the last year, the cost of the Journal has increased by about \$5.00 per year per member and, of course, the cost of putting on the conference continues to increase relative to the inflation rate. One of our biggest non-conference costs is WSSA News. Each issue of the newsletter costs about \$800 to print, which doesn't include setup costs.

After experimenting with various formats, we have determined that WSSA News can be put on-line in Adobe Acrobat format, which will

download very quickly. So what does this mean for you, and how will you know when the newsletter is posted? We will send you a postcard announcing important info, such as deadlines for conference registration and paper submissions, along with an announcement that WSSA News is ready for viewing on-line. In addition to reducing production costs, the postcards will allow us the chance to focus on info of urgent importance to members, while promoting greater use of WSSA's website. So what if you're not online? WSSA News will be mailed to you, but only upon request. -- Larry Gould



WSSA Encourages Student Involvement

t is a pleasure to serve as President of the WSSA this year. I am excited about our upcoming conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. It will be nice to host our membership in familiar territory. I would like to take this opportunity to talk about what is happening with our WSSA Student Involvement Committee. Our association has always taken a great interest in developing the professional skills of students.

The Student Involvement Committee is chaired by Sandra Davis, WSSA Vice-President. Committee members include Phadrea Ponds and Mary Conroy, past Executive Council members, and Ellen Maccarone and Richard Yon, graduate student members. During the Las Vegas conference the committee, with input from the Executive Council, identified four goals and possible activities to achieve these goals. The first goal is to provide a setting at future conferences where graduate students can connect and network. The committee is in the process of planning a graduate student reception for the Salt Lake City conference as a step towards implementing this goal.



The second goal is to continue to provide panels that assist students in their professional development. David Freeman and Bob Watson conduct a panel on publishing in the Social Science Journal at each conference. Larry Gould has conducted a panel on Preparation of the Professional Portfolio. These presentations have been very successful in providing a forum for graduate students preparing to go on the job market. It is the hope of the committee to recruit faculty from other universities and colleges to assist with these and other special panels.

The third goal is to encourage more graduate student participation in panels. The association also encourages bachelor-level student participation, with the hope that these students will continue their education. Each year, the WSSA sponsors a student paper competition where both an undergraduate and graduate student are honored for their research. These papers are presented at the conference. They also receive a plaque and an honorarium for their future education.

The final goal is to develop a more effective system for communicating information about the WSSA and the conference to graduate students. At this point the committee has written a letter that will be sent out to graduate schools and graduate student councils. They have identified about 110 universities (with the addresses of the schools and the degrees offered) that match the sections at our conference.

It is very refreshing and exciting to see the ideas and work already taking shape since our conference in Las Vegas. I want to thank all of the committee members for their hard work. I especially want to recognize Ellen Maccarone and Richard Yon for representing our graduate students with such enthusiasm. I encourage all of our membership to support the WSSA's push to increase our student membership and participation. I look forward to seeing all of you in Salt Lake City!



Q & A about Salt Lake City 2004

Lisa: What does Salt Lake City have to offer?

Diane: Well, it is very metropolitan but reminds you of a friendly small western town. As you are aware the Olympic Winter Games of 2002 were hosted here, which enhanced the community's profile with more shopping and sightseeing. There are two beautiful mountain ranges--the Wasatch to the east and the Oquirrhs to the west. I love the mountains. I cannot imagine living anywhere else. There are ten world-class ski resorts. I live to ski in the winter. Hiking, rock climbing, and mountain biking are just minutes away. The city is a thriving cultural center-home to one of the nation's finest regional symphony orchestras, world-class opera, dance, and theater com-

panies, the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, and a myriad of art galleries. Salt Lake is also the gateway to ten national parks within a day's drive. I think there are many attractions to keep you entertained.

Lisa: Tell me about the shopping?

Diane: Well, one of my mottos has always been "shop until you drop." Within seven blocks of the Sheraton City Center Hotel is the Crossroads Plaza and the new outdoor shopping mall, the Gateway. Of course, I like the Crossroads Plaza because

Nordstrom is located there. I have recently been thinking of taking up stock car racing along with my skiing and golf. I discovered they have a racetrack at Crossroads Plaza. You can race remote control cars at scale speeds up to 200 mph. This is good news because I had to stop speeding on the highways. Larry will love this, but what former police officer wouldn't. The Gateway is a haven for shoppers. There is everything from state-of-the-art sports equipment to clothes. They also have an IMAX 3D Experience and a world-class movie theatre.

Lisa: What about museums or other attractions?

Diane: Let me talk about a few of them. The Utah Museum of Natural History is located at the University of Utah. They have the Dinosaur Discovery Hall, an exhibit on Utah's Native Americans and the natural wonders of Utah, and there are always special touring exhibitions. The Clark Planetarium is a state-of-the-art star theatre with space/science exhibits, and a planetarium store. The Gallivan Center is an outdoor living room with a skating rink, amphitheater, and 16 unique art pieces recreating a natural Utah theme. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints Historic Temple Square offers many attractions and events for those interested in the history

of the state. Temple Square also has many beautiful flower gardens for your enjoyment. The Clark Planetarium, Gallivan Center, and Historic Temple Square are located downtown.

Lisa: What about restaurant choices?

Diane: There are so many great restaurants to choose from and yes, you can drink in Utah. All the restaurants serve beer and other beverages that have the same alcohol content as you would get in any other state. There are two shopping villages I suggest you visit. Foothill Village has an eclectic mix of restaurants and 30 specialty shops. Gardner Village is the restored Gardner Mill, built in 1877. It houses a restaurant and country store. There are historic homes renovated into quaint shops and there's a day spa. Historic Trolley Square also is one of Utah's premier shopping destinations. It houses the Hard Rock Café. Who knows? Maybe the Osmonds will show up--not!

Lisa: What about transportation?

Diane: The Utah Transit Authority serves the entire Wasatch Front, including the Ski Salt Lake Resorts, with buses and TRAX light-rail. UTA fares are \$1.25. Single ride TRAX tickets, along with bus transfers, are valid for 2 hours from time of purchase. All day passes are available for \$2.50 and are good for unlimited local bus and TRAX rides for the day of purchase.

Lisa: How do I submit a proposal to present in Salt Lake?

Diane: You can submit your proposal via the website (http://wssa.asu.edu). Please note which section you wish your proposal to be sent to for review. The deadline for proposals is December 1, 2003.

Lisa: So how do I register for the conference?

Diane: Conference participants are required to pre-register and pre-registration must reach the WSSA Business Office by fax or mail no later than April 9, 2004. Be sure to renew or join the WSSA membership (\$40 for individual members, \$25 for students and retired members). Conference fees are \$65 for regular members, \$35 for students/ retired members, \$95 for non-WSSA attendees, and \$45 for non-WSSA student attendees.

Lisa: What's the scoop on the Sheraton City Centre Hotel?

Diane: To receive the conference rate, you must register by March 20, 2004. The hotel number is (801) 401-2000. It features 362 comfortable guest rooms, an outdoor heated pool, an indoor whirlpool, a fitness facility, plus the Olio restaurant and The Bar lounge. The hotel is seven blocks from historic Temple Square and is near many fine restaurants.



Student Paper Competition Update

Student Paper Competition Winners Recognized at Las Vegas Conference

On Friday, April 11th, at the President's Luncheon, WSSA Vice-President Bob Frye announced the two winners of the 2003 WSSA Student Paper Competition. Rebecca Allen of Creighton University received the undergraduate award for her paper entitled "Abigail Adams, Gender, and Why America Failed to 'Remember the Ladies.'"

Kevin Spears of Colorado State University won the graduate award for his paper "The Colorado River Delta and NGO Interaction."

Each winner received a check for \$500, an engraved plaque, a free one-year subscription to the *Social Science Journal*, free conference registration, and the opportunity to present the winning paper at the 2003 conference in Las Vegas. Frye reported a sixty percent increase in the number of stu-

dent entries for 2003, thanked all who had helped publicize the competition, and praised the quality of the submissions. He was assisted in the judging of the papers by a committee composed of WSSA Vice-President candidates Sandy Davis of Colorado State University and Gary Linn of Tennessee State University.

The Scoop on the WSSA's 2004 Student Paper Competition

Plan now to encourage your students to submit their original research papers for the WSSA's 2004 Student Paper Competition. Winners in the undergraduate and graduate categories will receive cash awards (\$500), free conference registration at

the 2004 conference at Salt Lake City, a one-year free WSSA membership (including the Social Science Journal) and the opportunity to present their papers at the Salt Lake City Conference. The paper must be received on or before February 1, 2004. Papers are judged based on a) advancement of knowl-edge, b) appropriateness for a broad social science audience, c) quality and implementation of research design, d) definition and significance of topic, e) analysis of findings and discussion of their implications and f) clarity of writing. Papers cannot exceed 25 pages (which includes bibliography, tables, figures, appendices and other supporting materials). The cover page and abstract do not count as part of the 25 page limit. Papers longer than 25 pages will not be read (strictly enforced). All pages must be double-spaced and in 12 cpi font. Papers may

not be theses or dissertations previously presented or published. Authors may wish to consult the *Social Science Journal's* style guide for formatting information.

The WSSA covers a wide range of social science disciplines. Please indicate undergraduate or graduate status, institutional affiliation, address, phone number and e-mail address. Papers must be received on or before February 1, 2004. 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WSSA Is Going to Calgary and Denver

At the April 2003 conference in Las Vegas, a survey was circulated asking attendees to pick from a list of potential sites which ones they favored for 2007 and 2008. The clear choices were Denver (Downtown) and Calgary. Since the April meeting we have secured a contract with the Hyatt Regency in Calgary for the April 2007 meeting. This will be the first time that we will be crossing an international boundary for the conference. While this might be a bit risky, it was felt that with the very large representation in Canadian Studies and other affiliates that the risk was worth taking. We also have a great deal of support from the Canadian Government. I have visited the hotel and the surrounding area. To say the least, it is a great hotel and downtown Calgary is a great location for attendees to spend some of their down time while at the conference.

We decided to hold the 2008 conference in Denver. This will be the 50th anniversary of the Association; thus, it seemed appropriate to have the conference located geographically close to its roots. We are currently working with three hotels in the downtown area to determine which will best suit our needs. The three are the Adams Mark, the Hyatt and the Marriott. All of them are great facilities with many positive attributes. I expect that the final decision will be a difficult one.
