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What Is It that Makes a Social Scientist?

Dear WSSA members and friends,

I'd like to pose a question to you: What is it that makes you a social scientist? Is it a role, a label, an activity, a world view? Something else? The WSSA is an interdisciplinary, multi-disciplinary association, but it's important every once in awhile to look at what we have in common. In a discussion at the fall Executive Council meeting, for example, we found a variety of responses which I will share in a future letter. But I'd like to hear from you.

Another question: What do social scientists have to offer the world at this point in history, when so many systems seem to be breaking down, conflict and other problems are widespread, and yet at the same time we can perceive and communicate new ideas on a never-before-achieved global scale?

PRESIDENTIAL SOAPBOX



Most of us work in higher education. The WSSA does not have a section on education, but it is clear that the system, K-12 all the way through doctoral programs, is experiencing pressures that will yield massive transformations. How are these transformations affecting the questions we ask in our research? How do they affect our ability to conduct research?

Sometimes media coverage of social science meetings sounds like "Ripley's Believe It Or Not" rather than a serious announcement of new findings. Many of us have at one time or

another come across work that proves no topic is too small or obscure for a research study. By training, we have been encouraged to carve new niches rather than to examine the body of stone or wood (or soap? melting ice?) from which we are carving. This is what Kuhn called normal science. How does the instability of our times affect the need and ability to conduct normal science--or to shift our paradigm?

I greatly appreciate the opportunity this year as WSSA president to think more deeply about our profession and our many roles in higher education, government, business and non-profits, and society in general. We have so many opportunities to make a positive difference in the lives of our students, our organizations, and communities. Occasionally we also have the chance to make a difference in a wider arena, and always we can help our students and readers consider wider issues beyond immediate experience.

I hope you will engage your colleagues in some discussion of the above questions. I'd like to hear from you.

Fred R. Harris to Deliver Plenary Address

The WSSA is very pleased to announce that Fred R. Harris will be the plenary speaker for its 47th annual conference, to be held in Albuquerque, New Mexico from April 13-16, 2005. In addition to his current position as Professor of Political Science at the University of New Mexico, Harris has a long and distinguished career of public service. Professor Harris graduated from the University of Oklahoma's College of Law in 1954 with numerous awards for his academic performance. After practicing law and serving in the Oklahoma state legislature from 1956 to 1964, Harris was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1964 and served as National Democratic Party Chair in 1969-1970.

Professor Harris is the author or editor of 19 books, including two works of fiction. A small sampling of his non-fiction books includes: Alarms and Hopes (1968), Deadlock or Decision: The U.S. Senate and the Rise of National Politics (1993), and In Defense of Congress (1995). His works of fiction include Covote Revenge (1999), which was the Winner of the 2000 Nero Wolfe award, and Easy Pickins (2000). Professor Harris is a very dynamic speaker and has won numerous teaching awards. He is fluent in Spanish. The title of his plenary address will be: "The Baby Bust: Who Will do the Work? The WSSA Student Paper Competition

The WSSA holds a Student Paper Competition every year and I would appreciate it if you would encourage your students to submit their original research papers for the competition. It is open to undergraduate as well as graduate stu-

dents. The prize in each category is a cash award of \$500, free conference registration at the 2005 conference in Albuquerque, a one-year free WSSA membership (which includes *The Social Science Journal*). In addition, winners will have the opportunity to present their papers at the Albuquerque conference. The dead-line for receipt of papers is February 1st, 2005.

The criteria on which the papers will be judged are:

- a) advancement of knowledge;
- b) appropriateness for a broad social science audience;
- c) quality and implementation of research design;
- d) definition and significance of topic;
- e) analysis of findings and discussion of their implications;
- f) clarity of writing.

Papers should be no more than 25 pages long (which

includes bibliography, tables, figures, appendices and other supporting material). The cover page and abstract do not count as part of the 25-page limit. The page limit is strictly enforced: papers longer than 25 pages will not be read. All pages should be

double spaced, in 12 point font, preferably Arial. We do not accept theses or dissertations previously presented or published. Authors may wish to consult *The Social Science Journal's* style guide for formatting information.

As the name suggests, the WSSA encompasses a wide range of disciplines in the social sciences. It would be helpful to consult the WSSA website at *http://wssa.asu.edu/* to see listings of the sections for 2005. Papers should indicate undergraduate or graduate status, institutional affilia-

tion, address, phone number and e-mail address. Papers may be e-mailed in Word or rich text format to *dpbarrie@ucalgary.ca*. Choosing WSSA's Future Leadership

am writing to ask for your help in setting the future course of the Western Social Science Association. One of the ways that our future is determined is by the selection of new leadership for the association. Those who serve as Section Chairs are often taking the first step toward leadership in the WSSA; many Executive Council Members first offered their time and talents by acting as

coordinators for their disciplinary sections. Others have Scholer Scholer consistently attended the annual conferences, maintained their memberships, and promoted the association to colleagues and students. These are all good ways to serve and support the WSSA. While not all members aspire to serve as an elected officer of the WSSA, many find it a rewarding and natural progression of service to the WSSA. A immediate Past-President of WSSA, I serve as chair of a Nominating Committee for next year's election of council members and officers. I am in the process of forming the committee, and we will present our slate of candidates to the council for approval during our September, 2004, council meeting. Elections will be held during the Fall, 2004.

As a member of the WSSA, each of you has the opportunity to offer direct nominations for council seats. According to WSSA's Constitution:

The Committee shall submit to the Fall meeting of the Executive Council one or more nominees for each office to be filled. Members may offer additional nominations by

petition signed by five (5) members sent to the Executive Director, prior to the Fall meeting, postmarked no later than August 1. Upon ratification by majority vote of the Executive Council the Council shall send the list of nominees (including those by petition) to the membership. The Executive Director shall mail the completed ballots to

the membership (Article II, section 4).

If you, as a member, wish to nominate another member for a council seat, this is the way to do it. You are free to contact me to suggest a potential nominee so that the committee can contact that person directly to assess their interest in serving on council. Council membership requires commitment to attend council meetings during the three year term of office (one in September and two-Wednesday and Saturday-during the spring conference) and a willingness to support the mission and goals of the WSSA by serving on a committee or provid-

ing other assistance. We attempt to achieve academic and geographic diversity and to balance the needs of affiliate groups with the broader needs of the association.
