WSSA Prepares Itself for Las Vegas '03

The 45th Annual WSSA conference in Las Vegas is coming together as a showcase of our Association's interdisciplinary strength. There are many scholarly papers from a wide variety of disciplines which will be presented during the conference. Concurrent panel presentations from our 30 sections are scheduled from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 10; Friday, April 11; and Saturday, April 12. We have a couple of special topics that are noteworthy to mention. On Thursday we have a special presentation from the Criminal Justice and Criminology section entitled "Star Trek: Visions of Law and Justice in Teaching." This seems appropriate given that the Riviera is housed right next door to the *Star Trek* experience of Las Vegas. Each year we offer a special panel on "Publishing in *The Social Science Journal*." We encourage our membership to consider their scholarly work for publi-

It will resume on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday from 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. All registered participants can pick up their programs and abstract disks at registration. All presenters must be pre-registered. We also have on-site registration for those interested in attending panel presentations. Registration is located at the Riviera Convention Center at the West Desk which is located at the entrance to the convention center.

The Opening Reception: This is slated for Wednesday evening, April 9, featuring assorted cold canapes, a cash bar, and an official welcome by WSSA President Nicholas Peroff. We encourage all conference participants to attend. It is a good

The good news on the *SSJ* is that Nina Burkardt, Immediate Past President of WSSA, Larry Gould, Executive Council Member Sandy Davis, and Journal Editor David Freeman met in Denver with the publisher's representative for Elsevier at

the end of last year and we're now close to getting a new contract finalized. Moreover, Elsevier seems to be doing a better job of getting *SSJ* (including back issues) to members undamaged and in readable condition.

Everyone in Denver agreed that the journal is an important part of who we are as a professional educational association and we need to recognize that by establishing a standing committee of the Executive Council to pay attention to contract matters and other issues that come up with *SSJ* from time to time. The State of *The Social Science Journal*

For the last seven years, *The Social Science Journal* was published under a contract originally negotiated with JAI Press Inc. When Elsevier Science Inc. purchased JAI Press, the WSSA began a publishing relationship with Elsevier.

This contract expired on January 1, 2003, prompting the members of the Executive Council of WSSA to spend much of 2002 negotiating with Elsevier over a new contract. Past-President Nina Burkardt, President Nicholas Peroff, Executive Director Larry Gould, Editor David Freeman and the WSSA Executive Committee met and corresponded with Elsevier representative Geraldine Billingham to work out the details of the new contract. It is expected that the contract will be signed in early 2003.

With the exception of some production and distribution problems that arose in early 2002 when Elsevier moved much of its production and distribution offices to Ireland, Editor David Freeman established a good working relationship with Elsevier. By the fall of 2002 the distribution backlog was resolved and WSSA members now enjoy the ability to access the journal on-line.

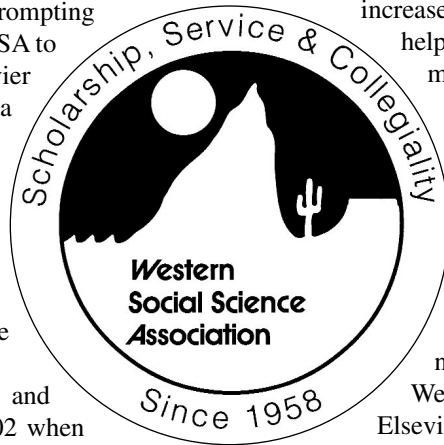
The new five-year contract provides a number of positives for the journal and the Association. For instance, it provides a larger page budget per year and there is an increase of 20% at no additional cost to the Association. Furthermore, the contract increases Elsevier's payment to the Association that helps defray the Association's office and annual meeting expenses.

Meanwhile, the journal has attracted a more diversified academic community that contributes research, research notes and book reviews, and it has also attracted a wider international audience.

Although *The Social Science Journal* is still a regional journal, it has grown into a very attractive national and international journal and Elsevier has contributed to this growth.

dinates the Masters in Public Administration degree program. She has served twice as a WSSA Section Coordinator for Public Administration, and has served a three-year term on the Executive Council and another year as WSSA Vice-President. We are pleased to have her continued involvement in the WSSA.

Sandra K. Davis was elected to the position of Vice President of the Western Social Science Association. She is Associate Professor of Political Science at Colorado State University and is finishing her final year as a member of the Executive Council. Her participation in the WSSA also includes service as coordinator of the Political Science section, presentation of papers at WSSA conferences, and authorship of an article in *The Social Science Journal*.

Six candidates competed for election to three Executive Council seats. Among the newly elected council members is N. Prabha Unnithan, Professor of Sociology at Colorado State University. Prabha has been connected with the WSSA for the past 15 years, beginning as a paper presenter and moderator and later graduating to become coordinator of the Sociology Section. He also served as Book Review Editor of *The Social Science Journal* from 1996 to 1999.

The second new council member is Susan Green Barger, the Assistant Director of the Women's Studies Program at Idaho State University, where she coordinates the Women's Studies Internship Program, the Bannock County Court Watch Program for Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Crimes, and the Women's History Month Committee. Currently she is co-editor for a special Women's Studies issue of *The Social Science Journal* due for publication in 2004 and is section coordinator for the WSSA's Women's Studies section for the 2004 conference in Las Vegas.

Richard V. Adkisson, associate professor of economics and international business at New Mexico State University, is the third new council member. He has been a member of the Western Social Science Association for eight years and has presented papers in the Association for Institutional Thought (AFIT), General Economics, and Association for Borderland Studies sections. Richard is in his third term as Secretary-Treasurer of AFIT and serves on the Editorial Board of the Journal of Economic

This would be a big change for the Association and not one that we would want to make without first consulting you, our WSSA members.

During our Spring 2003 conference in Las Vegas we will be surveying the membership to see if there is sufficient interest in pursuing the potential of holding our 2007 WSSA Conference in Calgary. At this point, I can tell you that the room costs are very competitive and there is some possibility that the WSSA could successfully enlist the financial assistance of the Province of Alberta and/or the Canadian Government to support the cost of the meeting. Please look for the survey at the spring meeting in Las Vegas and fill it out for us. I thank you ahead of time for your input.

The Search for the Editor of *The Social Science Journal*

David Freeman, editor of *The Social Science Journal*, is retiring as editor after this three-year term. His appointment will end December 31, 2005. It is time to start a process by which the next editor will be selected. The new editor would start January 1, 2006 and serve a three-year term. This seems like it is a long ways away, however, the process of calling for proposals, reviewing the proposals and selecting a successor does take time.

Over the next year the Executive Council will put together a call for proposals and charge a sub-committee to start the search. In January of 2004, the call for proposals will be widely circulated, with a deadline for submission to be determined at a later date. In July or August of 2004, the Committee will start the review process, which will include site visits. This process will probably take about six weeks. The new editor would be named in the Spring of 2005. Obviously, more information and more details regarding the role and responsibilities of the editor will be forthcoming.
