Dear Conference Participants,

Welcome to the 43rd Annual Conference of the Western Social Science Association. From our humble beginnings, we have grown into a diverse and sophisticated group of scholars. This year our meetings are characterized by a wide array of offerings, with something to interest everyone. I want to give a special thanks to the section coordinators who worked so hard to organize their sessions. The time and effort they devoted to this task is evident in the high quality of the conference program. I have enjoyed working with all of them.

Our multidisciplinary meetings provide us all with an excellent opportunity to share our research, reflect on the research of others, renew old acquaintances and make new friends. I hope you all have the chance to sit in on a few sessions outside of your discipline and observe how those in other social science fields approach research questions. In my years of attendance at the WSSA conference, I have found this time of stepping outside of my discipline most valuable and inspiring.

I hope you will take some time to explore our host city of Reno. First incorporated as a city in 1903, the Reno area has long been an oasis in the Nevada desert. In the mid-1800's, Reno's growth was stimulated by the pushing of the Central Pacific Railroad over the Sierra Nevada Mountains and the mining boom of the Comstock Lode. The news of a gold strike brought thousands of gold-rushers to and through the area. As the gold veins dwindled the miners finally discovered that the heavy "blue mud," which fouled their gear and frustrated their efforts to get at the gold, was silver. This discovery helped admit the "Silver State" into the Union—and the Civil War. The city was called the "End of the Track" for many years, but renamed after General Jesse Lee Reno, a Union officer during the Civil War. The present population of Reno is over 150,000, with more than 60,000 in nearby Sparks. Although gaming and tourism have long dominated the economy in Reno, the economy has strengthened and diversified in recent years with an influx of jobs associated with product distribution facilities and manufacturing. However, the mining and railroad history in the area is recalled in several local museums. What you see now is "New Reno," but "Old Reno" thrived long before the casinos and other modern businesses.

Have fun exploring Reno!
